MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF STEGER, WILL & COOK COUNTIES, ILLINOIS

The Board of Trustees convened in regular session at 7:00 P.M. on this 20th day of April, 2015 in the Municipal Building of the Village of Steger with the Village Clerk Carmen S. Recupito, Jr. attending and President Kenneth A. Peterson, Jr. presiding.

The Village Clerk called the roll and the following Trustees were present: Buxton, Skrezyna, Kozy, Lopez, Sarek and Perchinski. Also present were Village Administrator Mike Tilton, HR Director Mary Jo Seehausen, Fire Chief Nowell Fillion, Code Enforcement Officer Romulus Biris, EMA Chief Tom Johnston, Housing and Community Development Director Alice Peterson and Police Chief Carl A. Mormann.

AWARDS, HONORS & SPECIAL RECOGNITIONS

Mayor Peterson asked Sergeant Michael Haskins to come to the front of the room. The Village Clerk read Resolution No. 1078 Honoring Michael Haskins on His Retirement after 23 Years of Service. Trustee Perchinski made a motion to approve Resolution No. 1078. Trustee Lopez seconded the motion. Voice vote was called; all ayes. Motion carried. Police Chief Carl A. Mormann presented Sergeant Haskins with a plaque commemorating his years of service. The Board, Department Heads and the audience congratulated Sergeant Haskins.

MINUTES

Trustee Perchinski made a motion to approve the minutes of the previous Board Meeting, as written. Trustee Sarek seconded the motion. Voice vote was called; all ayes. Motion carried.

AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION

Jim Patrevito of East 227th Place discussed a Tree Trimming business in his neighborhood. Mayor Peterson explained that Dave Toepper was involved in an accident, but had met with the Tree Trimming business. Mayor Peterson will follow up on the progress.

Mr. Patrevito commented that an increased police presence in his neighborhood has not deterred those speeding on his street. Mayor Peterson will follow up with Dave Toepper regarding his research into a speed bump for the area.

Robert Alexander discussed a problem house in his neighborhood. He explained that every time he's called the police have come. Mr. Alexander and several of his neighbors are deeply concerned. Mayor Peterson explained that the village is doing everything in its power to address the problem. He will continue to make the house a priority and will keep the pressure on.

Mr. Alexander asked about the quiet zone study. Village Administrator Mike Tilton will address the quiet zone study in his report.

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Ms. Garza addressed the board regarding the quiet zone and the condition of the railroad tracks at 35th Street. There are huge potholes, no sidewalks and standing water. Ms. Garza has been calling the railroad for three years. Ms. Garza is opposed to the quiet zone because of the condition of the tracks.

Village Administrator Mike Tilton explained that there has been a rumor circulated that the 35th Street crossing might be closed to through traffic. When the quiet study moves ahead, the 35th Street crossing will be addressed. It will be left to the railroad weather to repair the tracks or to close the crossing. Ms. Garza explained that due to the many activities in the 35th Street area, the crossing should not be closed. The closing would not be within the control of the Village of Steger.

Mr. Patrevito explained that the audience has trouble hearing comments during "Audience Participation" and suggested the Village purchase a microphone. Administrator Tilton will look into purchasing one.

Mary Ann Spark asked the Board for permission to plant a garden behind the Centennial Village Senior Center on Village property. Mayor Peterson asked that Code Enforcement officer Biris look into the property for her.

Ms. Spark also commented on the condition of sidewalks due to cars parked at Corona Auto Repair. Code Enforcement will look into the situation.

Michael Riley of Cub Scout Pack 173 asked that his request to use Village Hall parking lot at 35 W. 34th Street be changed to Veterans Park.

REPORTS

Village Administrator Mike Tilton asked if anyone had further questions regarding the quiet zone study. Mr. Tilton explained that if approved, work could begin late this summer.

Mr. Tilton reported that he and HR Director Mary Jo Seehausen met with Pace Bus. Pace can provide a van to the Village at an initial fee of \$1,000 and additional \$100 per month for use of the van. The Village would have hire a driver, schedule rides for seniors and determine the service area. Pace provides maintenance for 3-5 years.

The contracts for alarms at Veterans Park and Hecht Park will be signed tonight.

South Chicago Heights contributed \$500 to the cost of the Summer Band program.

Director of Public Infrastructure Dave Toepper was absent.

Fire Chief Nowell Fillion reported that the Fire Department is up to 328 calls year to date. In prior two weeks there were 40 ambulance calls, 10 fire calls and gave mutual aid 8 times. Lt. Gibbs, John Pacelli and Todd Ragusin are completing their instructor one course and doing very well. Brian Pierce is completing his EMT training. Chief Fillion and three others have taken the state certified advanced

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technical firefighter exam. Chief Fillion and three other department members will be going to Indianapolis to the FDIC (Fire Department Instructors Conference) on Thursday and Friday April 23-24.

Chief Fillion explained that Firefighter Levitt and Administrator Tilton met with the Red Cross regarding a free smoke detector program. Firefighters will meet with residents in their home, discuss an escape plan and install up to 3 smoke detectors.

Police Chief Carl A. Mormann referred to his weekly reports. Chief Mormann reported that with the Village Attorney's assistance, the Police Department is now up and running with the Illinois Comptroller's Debt Recovery program. The first batch was submitted this afternoon.

EMA Chief Tom Johnston reported that the EMA Mobile Command Center is on site for inspection. Chief Johnston thanked HR Director Seehausen for posting open positions on the website.

Community Center Director Diane Rossi had no report.

HR Director Mary Jo Seehausen reported that employee health insurance premiums will decrease for the year beginning July 1, 2015 through April 30, 2016 of 8.6% on PPO 1.90% on HMO. Administrator Tilton added that Mary Jo is very good at clarifying and understanding insurance matters. The Mayor agreed.

Housing and Community Development Director Alice Peterson had no report.

Village Attorney Amber Mundy had no report.

Trustee Buxton gave the financial report. His report is attached to the minutes.

TRUSTEES' REPORTS

Trustee Skrezyna reported that Public Infrastructure Director Dave Toepper was involved in a car accident. Trustee Skrezyna asked that we all wish him a speedy recovery. Trustee Skrezyna commented that two programs will begin soon; hydrant flushing and street paving.

Trustee Kozy thanked HR Director Seehausen for posting EMA's job positions.

Trustee Lopez had no report.

Trustee Sarek reported that the repair of batting cages will be cost \$1,150.00. Trustee Sarek thanked Administrator Tilton for getting the parks alarmed. He also asked if the doors have been replaced yet. Administrator Tilton will talk with Public Works.

Trustee Perchinski had no report.

CLERK'S REPORT had had no report.

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<u>PRESIDENT'S REPORT</u> Mayor Peterson wished Infrastructure Director Dave Toepper a speedy recovery. Village services should proceed seamlessly in his absence.

AN ORDINANCE DENYING A ZONING MAP AMENDMENT FOR THE PROPERTY LOCATED AT 22635 STATE STREET, STEGER, ILLINOIS

WHEREAS, the property located at 22635 State Street, Steger, Illinois (the "Subject Property") is located in an area zoned R1B (Family Dwelling District); and

WHEREAS, Aaron Lake (the "Applicant") submitted a request to the Village of Steger (the "Village") seeking a rezoning of the Subject Property to B-1 (Business District-Limited Retail) so that he could operate a Great Danes Kennel; and

WHEREAS, the Village's Planning and Zoning Board of Appeals (the "PZBA") held a hearing, pursuant to proper notice, at which the Applicant provided testimony regarding his proposed use of the Subject Property, including using a barn and other auxiliary structures at the Subject Property to house up to eight (8) adult dogs and resulting litters in furtherance of the operation of a commercial kennel; and

WHEREAS, evidence was introduced at the aforesaid hearing establishing that: (1) the zoning and trend of development in the immediate area of the Subject Property is essentially residential in nature; (2) there is no property zoned with a "B-1" classification in the vicinity of the Subject Property; and (3) rezoning the Subject Property to a "B-1" classification would allow commercial uses in a residential neighborhood, and thus would negatively affect the values of neighboring properties and potentially interfere with the use and enjoyment of such properties; and

WHEREAS, based on the foregoing, the PZBA made certain findings of fact, which are set forth on the "Recommendation", attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit A, and made a recommendation to deny the requested zoning map amendment; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Steger, Counties of Cook and Will, and the State of Illinois, as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. <u>Recitals</u>. The foregoing recitals are herein incorporated and made a part of this Ordinance as if fully set forth herein.

<u>Section 2</u>. <u>Denial of Zoning Map Amendment</u>. The findings of fact and recommendation of the PZBA are hereby adopted and, in accordance with said findings and recommendation, the Village Board denies the requested zoning map amendment for the Subject Property.

<u>Section 3</u>. <u>Savings Clause</u>. This Ordinance shall not affect suits pending or rights existing at the time this Ordinance takes effect, but such suits and rights shall continue in force to the same extent and with like effect as if this Ordinance be taken,

construed or held to avoid or impair any cause of action now existing under any ordinance of the Village, or any amendment thereto, but as to any consideration of action now existing, such ordinance and amendment thereto, shall be continued in full force and effect.

<u>Section 4</u>. <u>Effective Date</u>. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage and publication as provided by law.

Dear Village President and Board of Trustees:

The Planning and Zoning Board of Appeals ("PZBA") held a public hearing on Wednesday, April 29, 2015 and voted to *deny the request* for a zoning change on the property commonly known as 22635 State Street (the "Subject Property"). Mr. Lake requested a zoning change from R1B (Family Dwelling District) to B-1 (Business District-Limited Retail) to allow him to operate a Great Danes Kennel.

During the public hearing, testimony and evidence were introduced establishing that: (a) the zoning and trend of development in the immediate area is essentially residential; (b) there is no property zoned with a "B-1" classification in the immediate vicinity of the Subject Property; and (c) rezoning the Subject Property to a "B-1" classification would permit commercial uses as a right in a residential neighborhood, and would thus negatively affect the values of neighboring property and potentially interfere with the use and enjoyment of such properties.

In light of the testimony and evidence introduced at the public hearing, the PZBA found that the proposed zoning change would not be in furtherance of the public interest and, therefore, the PZBA recommends denial.

WHEREAS, the Village of Steger, Counties of Cook and Will, State of Illinois (the "Village") is a duly organized and existing municipality and unit of local government created under the provisions of the laws of the State of Illinois, and is operating under the provisions of the Illinois Municipal Code, and all laws amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, with full powers to enact ordinances and adopt resolutions for the benefit of the residents of the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Village President (the "President") and Board of Trustees of the Village (the "Village Board" and together with the President, the "Corporate Authorities") are committed to providing safe and family-friendly recreational activities for Village residents and visitors; and

WHEREAS, currently, the Municipal Code of Steger, Illinois (the "Village Code") sets forth the membership and the powers of a recreation board for the Village (the "Recreation Board"); and

WHEREAS, among other things, the Recreation Board is responsible for providing and maintaining playgrounds and recreation centers within the Village; and

WHEREAS, in order to ensure the continued effective and efficient operation of the Recreation Board, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is necessary, advisable and in the best interests of the Village to provide for the designation of a chairman and a segretary of the Recreation Board; and

WHEREAS, based on the foregoing, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is necessary, advisable and in the best interests of the Village and its residents to amend Chapter 2, Section 2-456, of the Village Code as set forth herein;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Steger, Counties of Cook and Will, and the State of Illinois, as follows:

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

SECTION 1.0: Incorporation Clause.

The Corporate Authorities hereby find that all of the recitals hereinbefore stated as contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are full, true and correct and do hereby, by reference, incorporate and make them part of this Ordinance as legislative findings.

SECTION 2.0: Purpose.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to amend Chapter 2, Section 2-456, of the Village Code to provide for the appointment of a president and a secretary of the Recreation Board from among its membership.

ARTICLE II. AUTHORIZATION; AMENDMENT TO CHAPTER 2, SECTION 2-456, OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF STEGER, ILLINOIS

SECTION 3.0: Amendment to Chapter 2, Section 2-456.

That the Municipal Code of Steger, Illinois is hereby amended, notwithstanding any provision, ordinance, resolution or Village Code section to the contrary, by amending Chapter 2, Section 2-456 as follows,

Sec. 2-456. - Creation.

The recreation board shall consist of seven persons appointed by the president of the village, with the consent and approval of the board of trustees. The president of the village, with the consent and approval of the board of trustees, shall designate one member of the recreation board to serve as its chairman and one member to serve as its secretary.

SECTION 3.1: Other Actions Authorized.

The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village shall take all action necessary or reasonably required to carry out, give effect to and consummate the amendment contemplated by this Ordinance and shall take all action necessary in conformity therewith. The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village are specifically authorized and directed to draft and disseminate any and all necessary forms or notices to be utilized in connection with the intent of this Ordinance. All actions previously taken in conformity with the intent of this Ordinance are hereby ratified.

ARTICLE III. HEADINGS, SAVINGS CLAUSES, PUBLICATION, EFFECTIVE DATE

SECTION 4.0: Headings.

The headings of the articles, sections, paragraphs and subparagraphs of this Ordinance are inserted solely for convenience of reference and form no substantive part of this Ordinance nor should they be used in any interpretation or construction of any substantive provision of this Ordinance.

SECTION 5.0: Severability.

The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable and should any provision of this Ordinance be determined to be in conflict with any law, statute or regulation by a court of competent jurisdiction, said provision shall be excluded and deemed inoperative, unenforceable and as though not provided for herein, and all other provisions shall remain unaffected, unimpaired, valid and in full force and effect.

SECTION 6.0: Superseder.

All code provisions, ordinances, resolutions, rules and orders, or parts thereof, in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby superseded.

SECTION 7.0: Publication.

A full, true and complete copy of this Ordinance shall be published in pamphlet form or in a newspaper published and of general circulation within the Village as provided by the Illingis Municipal Code, as amended.

AN ORDINANCE REVISING SECTION III OF THE EMPLOYEE PERSONNEL MANUAL REGARDING THE PAYMENT OF CERTAIN PAID TIME OFF BENEFITS AND AUTHORIZING, APPROVING AND RATIFYING CERTAIN PAYMENTS RELATED THERETO FOR THE VILLAGE OF STEGER.

WHEREAS, the Village of Steger, Counties of Cook and Will, State of Illinois (the "Village") is a duly organized and existing municipality and unit of local government created under the provisions of the laws of the State of Illinois, and is operating under the provisions of the Illinois Municipal Code, and all laws amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, with full powers to enact ordinances and adopt resolutions for the benefit of the residents of the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Village President (the "President") and Board of Trustees of the Village (the "Village Board" and together with the President, the "Corporate Authorities") are committed to adopting employment policies necessary to ensure the efficient operation of the Village; and

WHEREAS, in connection with the foregoing, the Corporate Authorities previously adopted an employee personnel manual (the "Manual") for the Village; and

WHEREAS, currently, the Manual provides for the payment of certain paid time off benefits upon an employee's separation from the Village but is silent with regard to the payment of the same when a non-exempt employee is reclassified to an exempt position; and

WHEREAS, for accounting purposes, accrued and unused paid time off benefits constitute a financial liability to the Village; and

WHEREAS, in order to effectively manage the Village's financial liabilities and thereby ensure that the Village is able to continue to provide high quality public services, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is necessary, advisable, and in the best interests of the Village to revise Section III of the Manual to provide for the payment of certain paid time off benefits in those instances when a non-exempt employee is reclassified to an exempt position; and

WHEREAS, in connection with the foregoing, the Corporate Authorities have further determined that it is necessary, advisable and in the best interests of the Village to authorize, approve and ratify the payment of the value of vacation, sick and personal time benefits to those existing exempt employees who, as of the effective date hereof, have unused vacation, sick and personal time accrued during their prior, non-exempt service to the Village (the "Employees with Accrued Time"); and

WHEREAS, the revision to the Manual contemplated hereby shall not affect those employees of the Village whose terms and conditions of employment are governed by a collective bargaining agreement; and

WHEREAS, the revisions to Section III of the Manual are set forth in Exhibit

A, attached hereto and incorporated herein; and

WHEREAS, all other sections of the Manual shall remain unchanged; and NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Steger, Counties of Cook and Will, and the State of Illinois, as follows:

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

SECTION 1: Incorporation Clause.

The Corporate Authorities hereby find that all of the recitals hereinbefore stated as contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are full, true, and correct and

do hereby, by reference, incorporate and make them part of this Ordinance as legislative findings.

SECTION 2: Purpose.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to authorize and adopt revisions to Section III of the Manual to provide for the payment of certain paid time off benefits in those instances when a non-exempt employee is reclassified to an exempt position, to authorize, approve and ratify the payment of the value of accrued and unused vacation, sick and personal time to the Employees with Accrued Time, and to authorize the President or his designee to take such steps as are necessary to carry out the intent of this Ordinance.

ARTICLE II. AUTHORIZATION

SECTION 3: Authorization.

That the Village Board hereby authorizes and directs the adoption of the revised Section III of the Manual as set forth on Exhibit A, with such modifications thereto as shall be approved by the President and the Village Attorney. To ensure that the Policy remains current and effective, the Village Board authorizes the President or his designee to make revisions to Section III of the Manual from time-to-time as needed to remain consistent with the intent of this Ordinance. The revised Section III of the Manual as set forth on Exhibit A shall not affect the benefits awarded to employees who are governed by a collective bargaining agreement. The Village Board further authorizes, approves and ratifies the payment of the value of accrued and unused vacation, sick and personal time to the Employees with Accrued Time. Such payments shall be made, at the election of each of the Employees with Accrued Time, in either one payment or in two equal installment payments, prior to April 30, 2016. The Village Board further authorizes the President or his designee to

execute any and all documentation that may be necessary to carry out the intent of this Ordinance. The officers, employees, and/or agents of the Village shall take all action necessary or reasonably required by the Village to carry out, give effect to, and consummate the intent of this Ordinance. Any and all actions previously performed in connection with carrying out and consummating the intent of this Ordinance are hereby authorized, approved, and ratified by this reference.

ARTICLE III. HEADINGS, SAVINGS CLAUSES, PUBLICATION, EFFECTIVE DATE

SECTION: 4 Headings.

The headings of the articles, sections, paragraphs, and subparagraphs of this Ordinance are inserted solely for convenience of reference and form no substantive part of this Ordinance nor should they be used in any interpretation or construction of any substantive provision of this Ordinance.

9 Years & 1 day – 19 Year Employees	6.16	26	160

All employees eligible for vacation benefits should be aware of the following policies:

- 1. Vacation accrual will be calculated per pay period beginning with an employee's date of employment. Vacation accrual shall continue during vacation, recognized holidays, used sick leave, time off due to occupational disability, and any other paid leave. The maximum number of vacation hours which may be accrued by an employee is an amount equal to one and one-half times the number of vacation hours earned in one year.
- 2. On the years in which an employee earns an additional forty (40) vacation hours based on years of service, the new accrual factor will begin for the said employee one year prior. This is because an employee is owed those forty (40) vacation hours by his or her anniversary date. However, if an employee terminates employment with the Village of Steger on a vacation transitional year, the said employee will owe the Village all time accrued in advance for that additional forty (40) hours of vacation. The vacation transitional years are as listed:

One year and one day – Two years of employment Four years and one day – Five years of employment Nine years and one day – Ten years of employment

Nineteen years and one day – Twenty years of employment

- 3. Persons not employed full-time will not receive any vacation, unless otherwise provided for in the union contract.
- 4. When an employee leaves the employ of the Village <u>or is reclassified to exempt status</u>, the employee will receive his accrued vacation unless money (vacation time) is owed to the Village. In the event of an employee's reclassification to exempt status, the payment of accumulated and unused vacation time shall be made on the employee's last payroll check for his or her service in the non-exempt position and calculated based upon the employee's non-exempt wages.
- 5. No more than two (2) weeks of vacation time may be taken at a time unless authorized by the Department Head.
- 6. A vacation day(s) or half day(s) may be taken with consent of the Department Head. Vacation time cannot be taken in less than half day increments.
- 7. During the first two (2) weeks of each calendar year, the employee will advise the Department Head of his/her department of the period(s) he/she desires for vacation during the current calendar year. Vacation periods requested during the first two (2) weeks of each calendar year will be scheduled based on seniority on a rotating basis. For purposes of this sub-section, "rotating basis" shall mean that the employee with the highest seniority shall receive a scheduling preference for his or her first requested vacation period for the current calendar year and thereafter all other employees shall receive a maximum of one scheduling preference each calendar year in the order of their seniority. Requests to schedule vacation periods submitted after the second week of January, will be established on a first come, first serve basis for the remainder of the calendar year.
- 8. Department Heads will have final say as to vacation periods, including the discretion to approve or deny requests for vacation time based upon departmental staffing needs, but will try accommodating the employees requested time period. Only under an extreme emergency will vacations be granted on an immediate basis.
- 9. To qualify for vacation pay, a full-time employee must have worked for the Village ninety (90) days.

(....)

D. SICK LEAVE – FULL-TIME (NON-EXEMPT) EMPLOYEES EMPLOYED AS OF DECEMBER 31, 2013 (Revisions Proposed: May 4, 2015)

This Subsection D applies only to full-time (non-exempt) employees employed in a full-time (non-exempt) position as of December 31, 2013.

In the event any member of any department is injured or sick, rendering the employee unable or unfit to perform the employee's normal duties, the employee will be paid the normal hourly rate, if the employee called or notified the Department Head or Supervisor at least one (1) hour prior to employees' starting time.

- 1. All full-time employees will be granted eight (8) sick days, which is (64) hours per year. Sick time will accrue at the rate of 2.46 hours per pay period for each of the 26 pay periods throughout the calendar year.
- 2. All employees covered by the Union Contract will be granted sick leave according to the terms of the contract. For example, if the Union Contract states that those covered are entitled to nine (9) sick days which is (72) hours, then each employee will accrue at the rate of 2.77 hours per pay period for each of the 26 pay periods throughout the calendar year.
- 3. Reporting Sick Leave
 - a. When reporting absence the employee will report to the department head in charge of the said department. He/she will state the reason for absence and a telephone number that he/she can be reached at during his/her absence (pager number not acceptable).
 - b. When an employee reports an absence from work and when completing his/her payroll sheet, the date of absence must be reported.
 - c. Any employee that calls in sick on three (3) consecutive days must furnish the department supervisor with a doctor's certificate indicating that the employee is a patient, and indicating that the doctor observed the said employee during the three (3) day sick period. The certificate will also state when the employee may return to work. Failure to present said statement shall be cause for denying sick pay.
- 4. If an employee does not use many sick days, he or she may accumulate up to sixty (60) days. Unused sick leave will be compensated for at the time the employee separates from the Village or is reclassified to exempt status in the following manner:

- 6. Filing a false report of an illness or injury is looked upon as a serious breach of policy and may cause immediate termination of employment.
- 7. When determination is made by the attending doctor or doctor chosen by the Village of Steger's Insurance Company that indicates that the employee can be released for light duty. It is the policy of the Village of Steger that light duty, whenever possible shall be provided, and the employee shall be required to return to work.
- 6. Any full-time employee that takes a sick leave for ninety (90) days or more caused by a disabling injury or illness while off duty shall have his monthly medical insurance premiums paid for by the Village of Steger for the first ninety (90) days. After expiration of the first ninety (90) days the employee will have the option of paying the premium while on sick leave for a period not to exceed eighteen (18) months (COBRA).
- 7. A full-time employee who takes a sick leave for a disabling injury or illness incurred outside of their employment will be granted an opportunity to return to his or her former job in the event that the disability does not exceed ninety (90) days. During the period of the ninety (90) days the Village will have the right to receive medical reports relating to the continuing disability and obtain an independent evaluation at its own expense to determine if the disability is continuing.

E. PERSONAL TIME - FULL-TIME (NON-EXEMPT) EMPLOYEES EMPLOYED AS OF DECEMBER 31, 2013 (Proposed Revisions: May 4, 2015)

This Subsection E applies only to individuals employed in full-time (non-exempt) positions as of December 31, 2013.

Full-time employees will be awarded three (3) days, which is twenty-four (24) hours, per year (includes birthday holiday). This time may be carried over and the **employee may accrue a maximum of forty (40) hours**. Personal time may be taken with the Department Heads approval with no less than a twenty-four (24) hours' notice unless an emergency arises.

If personal time is to be used in combination with vacation time, this must be requested with the vacation request. If personal time is utilized in conjunction with two (2) sick days, then the Village will not have the right to demand a doctor's note before returning to work unless the Village has evidence that the employee was not ill or was working another job.

Effective 01/01/05, one (1) day, which is eight (8) hours of personal time was added in lieu of an Employee's Birthday as a holiday. The birthday holiday was removed from

the holiday pay schedule to facilitate bookkeeping. Employees are encouraged to take their birthday off as paid personal time.

Accrued but unused personal time will be compensated for at the time the employee separates from the Village or is reclassified to exempt status. In the event of an employee's reclassification to exempt status, the payment of accumulated and unused personal time shall be made on the employee's last payroll check for his or her service in the non-exempt position and calculated based upon the employee's non-exempt wages.

Subject: Vehicle Purchase

ACTION: For Monday, May 4, 2015

Brief History

In order to assure proper maintenance and longevity of the police department's fleet of vehicles, the department is seeking to purchase two vehicles, adding one additional vehicle to its current fleet. One of the new vehicles will be replacing vehicle 08-1, which was a 2008 Ford Explorer. This vehicle was transferred to the Fire Department on January 20, 2015, reducing the department's fleet. Both new vehicles will be utilized by the patrol division of the police department and will be fully marked patrol vehicles.

Analysis of Issue

The addition of the two new vehicles will allow for the additional longevity of our current vehicles which would normally be rotated out of service. The vehicles which would be purchased would include two 2016 model year Ford Explorers. This particular vehicle is available through the Suburban Purchasing Cooperative at a cost of approximately \$24,800.00 each. With all required additional emergency equipment and installation expenses the total cost of this vehicle is approximately \$32,457.75 each.

Budget Impact

The total cost of the 2 new vehicles is approximately \$64.915.50. The purchase of said vehicles was anticipated, and the associated expenses were included in the police department's annual budget which has already been approved. These funds however, would need to be financed by the village. Attached is a proposal and list of the complete vehicle description provided by both Currie Motors and Terry's Ford of Peotone.

Staff Conclusions/Recommendations

Staff recommends purchasing said vehicles.

Alternatives

Maintain current fleet of vehicles as currently in place.



Federal Legislation on Lowering Flag to Half-Staff on May 15th

Fifty-one years ago, in 1962, President John F. Kennedy signed Public law 87-726 designating May 15th as Peace Officer' Memorial Day, and the week in which May 15th falls as National Police Week. The law was amended by the Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994, Public Law 103-322, signed by President Bill Clinton, directing that the flag of the United States be displayed at half-staff on all government buildings on May 15th each year. While the actual dates change from year to year, National Police Week is always the calendar week, beginning on Sunday, which includes May 15th.

Proclamation National Police Week

Whereas, The Congress and President of the United States have designated May 15th as Peace Officers' Memorial Day, and the week in which May 15th falls as National Police Week; and

Whereas, the members of the law enforcement agency of Steger play an essential role in safeguarding the rights and freedoms of Steger; and

Whereas, it is important that all citizens know and understand the duties, responsibilities, hazards, and sacrifices of their law enforcement agency, and that members of our law enforcement agency recognize their duty to serve the people by safeguarding life and property, by protecting them against violence and disorder, and by protecting the innocent against deception and the weak against oppression; and

Whereas, the men and women of the law enforcement agency of Steger unceasingly provide a vital public service;

Now, therefore, I, Village President of Steger, call upon all citizens of Steger and upon all patriotic, civic and educational organizations to observe the week of May 10 - 16, 2015, as Police Week with appropriate ceremonies and observances in which all of our people may join in commemorating law enforcement officers, past and present, who, by their faithful and loyal devotion to their responsibilities, have rendered a dedicated service to their communities and, in so doing, have established for themselves an enviable and enduring reputation for preserving the rights and security of all citizens.

I further call upon all citizens of Steger to observe Friday, May 15, 2015, as Peace Officers' Memorial Day in honor of those law enforcement officers who, through their courageous deeds, have made the ultimate sacrifice in service to their community or have become disabled in the performance of duty, and let us recognize and pay respect to the survivors of our fallen heroes.

In witness thereof, I have here unto set my hand and caused the Seal of the Village of Steger to be affixed.
