MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING
OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE
VILLAGE OF STEGER, WILL & COOK
COUNTIES, ILLINOIS

The Board of Trustees convened in regular session at 7:00 P.M. on this 4th day of May, 2015 in the Municipal Building of the Village of Steger with the Village Clerk Carmen S. Recupito, Jr. attending and President Kenneth A. Peterson, Jr. presiding.

The Village Clerk called the roll and the following Trustees were present: Buxton, Skrezyna, Kozy, Lopez, Sarek and Perchinski. Also present were HR Director Mary Jo Seehausen, Fire Chief Nowell Fillion, Code Enforcement Officer Romulus Biris, EMA Chief Tom Johnston, Housing, Community Center Director Diane Rossi and Community Development Director Alice Peterson and Police Chief Carl A. Mormann.

AWARDS, HONORS & SPECIAL RECOGNITIONS

None.

MINUTES

Trustee Lopez made a motion to approve the minutes of the previous Board Meeting, as written. Trustee Kozy seconded the motion. Voice vote was called; all ayes. Motion carried.

AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION

Jim Patrevito of 85 East 227th Place approached the Board and inquired about a microphone that would help the audience to better hear the meeting participants. Mayor Peterson explained that the Village Administrator is looking into acquiring a microphone.

Scott Smith of 87 227th Street asked about the progress of the Water Reclamation tax being removed from the tax bills of the Miller Woods residents. Attorney Amber Munday reported that progress is being made. Ms. Munday will report to the Board and Mayor Peterson will have an update posted on the Village website.

REPORTS

Village Administrator Mike Tilton was absent.

Director of Public Infrastructure Dave Toepper was absent. Code Enforcement Officer Romulus Biris had no report.

Fire Chief Nowell Fillion reported that the Fire Department is up to 393 calls year to date. In prior two weeks there were 76 ambulance calls, 14 fire calls and gave mutual aid 9 times. Lt. Gibbs, John Pacelli and Todd Ragusin are completing their instructor one course and doing very well. Brian Pierce is completing his EMT training. Chief Fillion and Lt. Gibbs and Firefighter Husarik all passed the state certified advanced technical firefighter exam.

Deputy Fire Chief Baine is working with the Illinois Department of Natural Resources on a 50/50 grant for brush fire equipment.

Police Chief Carl A. Mormann referred to his weekly reports.

EMA Chief Tom Johnston reported that EMA had 8 regular patrols, 5 emergency callouts, 4 mutual aid calls in April for total of 207 man-hours.

Chief Johnston also reported the Little League parade went well with no problems.

Chief Johnston attended an Emergency Management Coordinator meeting in Joliet. Will county is working on an emergency management operating procedure to be tested by a committee formed by Steger, Crete and Beecher.

Community Center Director Diane Rossi reminded the audience that the adult Sock Hop will be held May 15th from 6-9pm at the Community Center. The event is free, but pre-registration is required.

HR Director Mary Jo Seehausen had no report.

Housing and Community Development Director Alice Peterson referred to her weekly report.

Village Attorney Amber Mundy had no report.

TRUSTEES' REPORTS

Trustee Buxton gave the financial report. His report is attached to the minutes.

Trustee Skrezyna had no report

Trustee Sarek reported that Opening Day for girls Softball is this Saturday at 11am. Trustee Sarek also asked that the doors be installed at the Recreation Building prior to Opening Day.

Trustee Sarek asked the Board to approve the "double safety" for the top of the fence at the girls' softball field, at a cost of about \$400. Trustee Lopez made a motion to approve the purchase. Trustee Skrezyna seconded the motion. Roll was called and the following Trustees voted aye; Buxton, Skrezyna, Kozy, Lopez, Sarek and Perchinski. Mayor Peterson voted aye. Motion carried.

Trustee Perchinski reported that Layne Marino, the Village liaison to the Southeast Commuter Rail, that the grant to continue the study has been suspended.

Trustee Kozy thanked the Board and the audience for the last twelve years. May 4th was Mr. Kozy's last day on the Board. The audience applauded Mr. Kozy.

CLERK'S REPORT had no report.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT Mayor Peterson reported that he has met with the architects regarding the Village Hall and will meet again later this month. In June the Mayor will hold town hall meetings to provide better information.

Recently a CMAP meeting was held and several residents were in attendance.

Mayor Peterson threw out the first pitch at the Little League Opening Day festivities.

Mayor Peterson thanked Trustee Kozy for his contributions over his 12 years on the Board.

Trustee Skrezyna made a motion to pay the bills as listed. Trustee Sarek seconded the motion. Roll was called and the following Trustees voted aye; Buxton, Skrezyna, Kozy, Lopez, Sarek and Perchinski. Mayor Peterson voted aye. Motion carried.

CORRESPONDENCE

Laura Elton requested placement of an "Autistic child at Play" sign in her neighborhood. Trustee Perchinski made a motion to approve the placement of the sign. Trustee Lopez seconded the motion. Roll was called and the following Trustees voted aye; Buxton, Skrezyna, Kozy, Lopez, Sarek and Perchinski. Mayor Peterson voted aye. Motion carried. Mayor Peterson asked Public Infrastructure to look into purchasing the sign and to work with the Police Department in its placement.

Trustee Perchinski made a motion to accept the resignation of Harry Hammock as Recreation Board President. Trustee Buxton seconded the motion. Voice vote was called; all ayes. Motion carried. Mayor Peterson thanked Mr. Hammock for his service. Mr. Hammock will continue to work with the baseball program.

Trustee Lopez made the Motion to authorize and approve a Collective Bargaining Agreement between the Village of Steger and the Metropolitan Alliance of Police, Steger Chapter 117, and to Ratify all Actions Taken Consistent with the Terms Thereof. Trustee Perchinski seconded the motion. Roll was called and the following Trustees voted aye; Buxton, Skrezyna, Kozy, Lopez, Sarek and Perchinski. Mayor Peterson voted aye. Motion carried.

The Village Clerk administered the oath of office to William Joyce who was duly elected as Village Trustee on the April 7, 2015 election. Trustee Joyce therefore assumed his chair of office.

The audience congratulated the new Trustees.

Trustee Perchinski made a motion to approve the appointments by the Mayor. Trustee Sarek seconded the motion. Roll was called and the following Trustees voted aye; Buxton, Skrezyna, Lopez, Sarek Perchinski and Joyce. Mayor Peterson voted aye. Motion carried.

Trustee Perchinski made a motion to adopt ORDINANCE NO. 1096 DENYING A ZONING MAP AMENDMENT FOR THE PROPERTY LOCATED AT 22635 STATE STREET, STEGER, ILLINOIS. Trustee Lopez seconded the motion. Roll was called and the following Trustees voted aye; Buxton, Skrezyna, Lopez, Sarek Perchinski and Joyce. Mayor Peterson voted aye. Motion carried.

Trustee Perchinski made a motion to adopt ORDINANCE NO. 1097 AMENDING CHAPTER 2, SECTION 2-456, OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF STEGER, ILLINOIS REGARDING THE RECREATION BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF STEGER. Trustee Buxton seconded the motion. Roll was called and the following Trustees voted aye; Buxton, Skrezyna, Lopez, Sarek Perchinski and Joyce. Mayor Peterson voted aye. Motion carried.

Trustee Perchinski made a motion to adopt ORDINANCE NO. 1098 REVISING SECTION III OF THE EMPLOYEE PERSONNEL MANUAL REGARDING THE PAYMENT OF CERTAIN PAID TIME OFF BENEFITS AND AUTHORIZING, APPROVING AND RATIFYING CERTAIN PAYMENTS RELATED THERETO FOR THE VILLAGE OF STEGER. Trustee Buxton seconded the motion. Roll was called and the following Trustees voted aye; Buxton, Skrezyna, Lopez, Sarek Perchinski and Joyce. Mayor Peterson voted aye. Motion carried.

Trustee Perchinski made a motion to approve the request from Chief of Police Carl A. Mormann for the purchase of two 2016 Ford Explorers for the patrol division. The cost for the two vehicles and the required emergency equipment is approximately \$64,915.50. Trustee Skrezyna seconded the motion. Roll was called and the following Trustees voted aye; Buxton, Skrezyna, Lopez, Sarek Perchinski and Joyce. Mayor Peterson voted aye. Motion carried. Trustee Lopez asked that Chief Mormann come back to the Board with a rate for the financing of the two vehicles.

The Clerk read the National Police Week Proclamation (May 10th-16th, 2015) Trustee Perchinski made a motion to accept the Proclamation. Trustee Buxton seconded the motion. Voice vote was called; all ayes.

Trustee Perchinski made a motion to approve the Request of Samantha Zdzinicki for a temporary liquor license on May 17th from noon to 6pm at Veterans Park for a fundraiser. Dram Insurance will be provided. The fundraiser will benefit the Alton Bradley family. Trustee Skrezyna seconded the motion. Roll was called and the following Trustees voted aye; Buxton, Skrezyna, Lopez, Sarek Perchinski and Joyce. Mayor Peterson voted aye. Motion carried.

Trustee Pechinski made a motion to approve the Temporary Business License Application of Plexus Salon, Inc. at 35 E. 34th Street Pending inspections. Trustee Sarek seconded the motion. SECTION 1: To the extent and as required by the Act, the general prevailing rate of wages in the locality of the Village for laborers, mechanics and other workers engaged in the construction of public works coming under the jurisdiction of the Village is hereby ascertained to be the same as the prevailing rate of wages for construction work in Cook and Will Counties, as applicable, as determined by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois (the "Department") as of June of the current year, a copy of the Department's determinations being attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit A. As required by the Act, any and all revisions of the prevailing rate of wages by the Department shall supersede the Department's June determination and apply to any and all public works construction undertaken by the Village. The definition of any terms appearing in this Ordinance that are also used in the Act shall be the same as in the Act.

SECTION 2: Nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply said general prevailing rate of wages as herein ascertained to any work or employment except public works construction of the Village to the extent required by the Act.

SECTION 3: The Village Clerk shall publicly post or keep available for inspection by any interested party in the main office of the Village the Determination or any revisions of such prevailing rate of wage. A copy of the Determination or of the current revised determination of prevailing rate of wages then in effect shall be attached to all contract specifications to the extent required by the Act.

SECTION 4: The Village Clerk shall mail a copy of the Determination to any employer, and to any association of employers and to any person or association of employees who have filed their names and addresses, requesting copies of any determination stating the particular rates and the particular class of workers whose rates will be affected by such rates.

SECTION 5: The Village Clerk shall promptly (and in no event later than July 15, 2015) file a certified copy of this Ordinance with the Department and shall, with thirty (30)

calendar days after such filing, publish in a newspaper of general circulation within the Village a notice that the Determination is effective.

SECTION 6: The Village Clerk shall cause to be published this Ordinance in pamphlet form.

Explanations

COOK COUNTY

The following list is considered as those days for which holiday rates of wages for work performed apply: New Years Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and Veterans Day in some classifications/counties. Generally, any of these holidays which fall on a Sunday is celebrated on the following Monday. This then makes work performed on that Monday payable at the appropriate overtime rate for holiday pay. Common practice in a given local may alter certain days of celebration. If in doubt, please check with IDOL.

TRUCK DRIVERS (WEST) - That part of the county West of Barrington Road.

EXPLANATION OF CLASSES

ASBESTOS - GENERAL - removal of asbestos material/mold and hazardous materials from any place in a building, including mechanical systems where those mechanical systems are to be removed. This includes the removal of asbestos materials/mold and hazardous materials from ductwork or pipes in a building when the building is to be demolished at the time or at some close future date.

ASBESTOS - MECHANICAL - removal of asbestos material from mechanical systems, such as pipes, ducts, and boilers, where the mechanical systems are to remain.

CERAMIC TILE FINISHER

The grouting, cleaning, and polishing of all classes of tile, whether for interior or exterior purposes, all burned, glazed or unglazed products; all composition materials, granite tiles, warning detectable tiles, cement tiles, epoxy composite materials, pavers, glass, mosaics, fiberglass, and all substitute materials, for tile made in tile-like units; all mixtures in tile like form of cement, metals, and other materials that are for and intended for use as a finished floor surface, stair treads, promenade roofs, walks, walls, ceilings, swimming pools, and all other places where tile is to form a finished interior or exterior. The mixing of all setting mortars including but not limited to thin-set mortars, epoxies, wall mud, and any other sand and cement mixtures or adhesives when used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. The handling and unloading of all sand, cement, lime, tile, fixtures, equipment, adhesives, or any other materials to be used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. Ceramic Tile Finishers shall fill all joints and voids regardless of method on all tile work, particularly and especially after installation of said tile work. Application of any and all protective coverings to all types of tile installations including, but not be limited to, all soap compounds, paper products, tapes, and all polyethylene coverings, plywood, masonite, cardboard, and any new type of products that may be used to protect tile installations, Blastrac equipment, and all floor scarifying equipment used in preparing floors to receive tile. The clean up and removal of all waste and materials. All demolition of existing tile floors and walls to be re-tiled.

COMMUNICATIONS ELECTRICIAN

Installation, operation, inspection, maintenance, repair and service of radio, television, recording, voice sound vision production and reproduction, telephone and telephone interconnect, facsimile, data apparatus, coaxial, fibre optic and wireless equipment, appliances and systems used for the transmission and reception of signals of any nature, business, domestic, commercial, education, entertainment, and residential purposes, including but not limited to, communication and telephone, electronic and sound equipment, fibre optic and data communication systems, and the performance of any task directly related to such installation or service whether at new or existing sites, such tasks to include the placing of wire and cable and electrical power conduit or other raceway work within the equipment room and pulling wire and/or cable through conduit and the installation of any incidental conduit, such that the employees covered hereby can complete any job in full.

MARBLE FINISHER

Loading and unloading trucks, distribution of all materials (all stone, sand, etc.), stocking of floors with material, performing all rigging for heavy work, the handling of all material that may be needed for the installation of such materials, building of scaffolding, polishing if needed, patching, waxing of material if damaged, pointing up, caulking, grouting and cleaning of marble, holding water on diamond or Carborundum blade or saw for setters cutting, use of tub saw or any other saw needed for preparation of material, drilling of holes for wires that anchor material set by setters, mixing up of molding plaster for installation of material, mixing up thin set for the installation of material, mixing up of sand to cement for the installation of material and such other work as may be required in helping a Marble Setter in the handling of all material in the erection or installation of interior marble, slate, travertine, art marble, serpentine, alberene stone, blue stone, granite and other stones (meaning as to stone any foreign or domestic materials as are specified and used in building interiors and exteriors and customarily known as stone in the trade), carrara, sanionyx, vitrolite and similar opaque glass and the laying of all marble tile, terrazzo tile, slate tile and precast tile, steps, risers treads, base, or any other materials that may be used as substitutes for any of the aforementioned materials and which are used on interior and exterior which are installed in a similar manner.

MATERIAL TESTER I: Hand coring and drilling for testing of materials; field inspection of uncured concrete and asphalt.

MATERIAL TESTER II: Field inspection of welds, structural steel, fireproofing, masonry, soil, facade, reinforcing steel, formwork, cured concrete, and concrete and asphalt batch plants; adjusting proportions of bituminous mixtures.

OPERATING ENGINEER - BUILDING

Asphalt Plant; Asphalt Spreader; Autograde; Backhoes with Caisson Attachment; Batch Plant; Benoto (requires Two Engineers); Boiler and Throttle Valve; Caisson Rigs; Central Redi-Mix Plant; Combination Back Hoe Front End-loader Machine; Compressor and Throttle Valve; Concrete Breaker (Truck Mounted); Concrete Conveyor; Concrete Conveyor (Truck Mounted); Concrete Paver Over 27E cu. ft; Concrete Paver 27E cu. ft. and Under; Concrete Placer; Concrete Placing Boom; Concrete Pump (Truck Mounted); Concrete Tower; Cranes, All; Cranes, Hammerhead; Cranes, (GCI and similar Type); Creter Crane; Spider Crane; Crusher, Stone, etc.; Derricks, All; Derricks, Traveling; Formless Curb and Gutter Machine; Grader, Elevating; Grouting Machines; Heavy Duty Self-Propelled Transporter or Prime Mover; Highlift Shovels or Front Endloader 2-1/4 yd. and over; Hoists, Elevators, outside type rack and pinion and similar machines; Hoists, One, Two and Three Drum; Hoists, Two Tugger One Floor; Hydraulic Backhoes; Hydraulic Boom Trucks; Hydro Vac (and similar equipment); Locomotives, All; Motor Patrol; Lubrication Technician; Manipulators; Pile Drivers and Skid Rig; Post Hole Digger; Pre-Stress Machine; Pump Cretes Dual Ram; Pump Cretes: Squeeze Cretes-Screw Type Pumps; Gypsum Bulker and Pump; Raised and Blind Hole Drill; Roto Mill Grinder; Scoops - Tractor Drawn; Slip-Form Paver; Straddle Buggies; Operation of Tie Back Machine; Tournapull; Tractor with Boom and Side Boom; Trenching Machines.

Class 2. Boilers; Broom, All Power Propelled; Bulldozers; Concrete Mixer (Two Bag and Over); Conveyor, Portable; Forklift Trucks; Highlift Shovels or Front Endloaders under 2-1/4 yd.; Hoists, Automatic; Hoists, Inside Elevators; Hoists, Sewer Dragging Machine; Hoists, Tugger Single Drum; Laser Screed; Rock Drill (Self-Propelled); Rock Drill (Truck Mounted); Rollers, All; Steam Generators; Tractors, All; Tractor Drawn Vibratory Roller; Winch Trucks with "A" Frame.

Class 3. TRAFFIC SAFETY

Work associated with barricades, horses and drums used to reduce lane usage on highway work, the installation and removal of temporary lane markings, and the installation and removal of temporary road signs.

TRUCK DRIVER - BUILDING, HEAVY AND HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION - EAST & WEST

Class 1. Two or three Axle Trucks. Class 3. Five axle trucks; Dump Crets and Adgetors 7 yards and over; Dumpsters, Track Trucks, Euclids, Hug Bottom Dump Turntrailers or turnapulls when pulling other than self-loading equipment or similar equipment over 16 cubic yards; Explosives and/or Fission Material Trucks; Mixer Trucks 7 yards or over; Mobile Cranes while in transit; Oil Distributors, 1-man operation; Pole Trailer, over 40 feet; Pole and Expandable Trailers hauling material over 50 feet long; Slurry trucks, 1-man operation; Winch trucks, 3 axles or more; Mechanic--Truck Welder and Truck Painter.

Class 4. Six axle trucks; Dual-purpose vehicles, such as mounted crane trucks with hoist and accessories; Foreman; Master Mechanic; Self-loading equipment like P.B. and trucks with scoops on the front.

Other Classifications of Work:

For definitions of classifications not otherwise set out, the Department generally has on file such definitions which are

available. If a task to be performed is not subject to one of the classifications of pay set out, the Department will upon being contacted state which neighboring county has such a classification and provide such rate, such rate being deemed to exist by reference in this document. If no neighboring county rate applies to the task, the Department shall undertake a special determination, such special determination being then deemed to have existed under this determination. If a project requires these, or any classification not listed, please contact IDOL at 217-782-1710 for wage rates or clarifications.

LANDSCAPING

Landscaping work falls under the existing classifications for laborer, operating engineer and truck driver. The work performed by landscape plantsman and landscape laborer is covered by the existing classification of laborer. The work performed by landscape operators (regardless of equipment used or its size) is covered by the classifications of operating engineer. The work performed by landscape truck drivers (regardless of size of truck driven) is covered by the classifications of truck driver.

MATERIAL TESTER & MATERIAL TESTER/INSPECTOR I AND II

Notwithstanding the difference in the classification title, the classification entitled "Material Tester I" involves the same job duties as the classification entitled "Material Tester/Inspector I". Likewise, the classification entitled "Material Tester II" involves the same job duties as the classification entitled "Material Tester/Inspector II".

Explanations

WILL COUNTY

The following list is considered as those days for which holiday rates of wages for work performed apply: New Years Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and Veterans Day in some classifications/counties. Generally, any of these holidays which fall on a Sunday is celebrated on the following Monday. This then makes work performed on that Monday payable at the appropriate overtime rate for holiday pay. Common practice in a given local may alter certain days of celebration. If in doubt, please check with IDOL.

EXPLANATION OF CLASSES

ASBESTOS - GENERAL - removal of asbestos material/mold and hazardous materials from any place in a building, including mechanical systems where those mechanical systems are to be removed. This includes the removal of asbestos materials/mold and hazardous materials from ductwork or pipes in a building when the building is to be demolished at the time or at some close future date.

ASBESTOS - MECHANICAL - removal of asbestos material from mechanical systems, such as pipes, ducts, and boilers, where the mechanical systems are to remain.

CERAMIC TILE FINISHER

The grouting, cleaning, and polishing of all classes of tile, whether for interior or exterior purposes, all burned, glazed or unglazed products; all composition materials, granite tiles, warning detectable tiles, cement tiles, epoxy composite materials, pavers, glass, mosaics, fiberglass, and all substitute materials, for tile made in tile-like units; all mixtures in tile like form of cement, metals, and other materials that are for and intended for use as a finished floor surface, stair treads, promenade roofs, walks, walls, ceilings, swimming pools, and all other places where tile is to form a finished interior or exterior. The mixing of all setting mortars including but not limited to thin-set mortars, epoxies, wall mud, and any other sand and cement mixtures or adhesives when used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. The handling and unloading of all sand, cement, lime, tile, fixtures, equipment, adhesives, or any other materials to be used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. Ceramic Tile Finishers shall fill all joints and voids regardless of method on all tile work, particularly and especially after installation of said tile work. Application of any and all protective coverings to all types of tile installations including, but not be limited to, all soap compounds, paper products, tapes, and all polyethylene coverings, plywood, masonite, cardboard, and any new type of products that may be used to protect tile installations, Blastrac equipment, and all floor scarifying equipment used in preparing floors to receive tile. The clean up and removal of all waste and materials. All demolition of existing tile floors and walls to be re-tiled.

COMMUNICATIONS TECHNICIAN

Installation, operation, inspection, maintenance, repair and service of radio, television, recording, voice, sound and vision production and reproduction, telephone and telephone interconnect, facsimile, equipment and appliances used for domestic, commercial, educational and entertainment purposes, pulling of wire through conduit but not the installation of conduit.

MARBLE FINISHER

Loading and unloading trucks, distribution of all materials (all stone, sand, etc.), stocking of floors with material, performing all rigging for heavy work, the handling of all material that may be needed for the installation of such materials, building of scaffolding, polishing if needed, patching, waxing of material if damaged, pointing up, caulking, grouting and cleaning of marble, holding water on diamond or Carborundum blade or saw for setters cutting, use of tub saw or any other saw needed for preparation of material, drilling of holes for wires that anchor material set by setters, mixing up of molding plaster for installation of material, mixing up thin set for the installation of material, mixing up of sand to cement for the installation of material and such other work as may be required in helping a Marble Setter in the handling of all material in the erection or installation of interior marble, slate, travertine, art marble, serpentine, alberene stone, blue stone, granite and other stones (meaning as to stone any foreign or domestic materials as are specified and used in building interiors and exteriors and customarily known as stone in the trade), carrara, sanionyx, vitrolite and similar opaque glass and the laying of all marble tile, terrazzo tile, slate tile and precast tile, steps, risers treads, base, or any other materials that may be used as substitutes for any of the aforementioned materials and which are used on interior and exterior which are installed in a similar manner.

MATERIAL TESTER I: Hand coring and drilling for testing of materials; field inspection of uncured concrete and asphalt.

MATERIAL TESTER II: Field inspection of welds, structural steel, fireproofing, masonry, soil, facade, reinforcing steel, formwork, cured concrete, and concrete and asphalt batch plants; adjusting proportions of bituminous mixtures.

OPERATING ENGINEER - BUILDING

Class 1. LANDSCAPING

Landscaping work falls under the existing classifications for laborer, operating engineer and truck driver. The work performed by landscape plantsman and landscape laborer is covered by the existing classification of laborer. The work performed by landscape operators (regardless of equipment used or its size) is covered by the classifications of operating engineer. The work performed by landscape truck drivers (regardless of size of truck driven) is covered by the classifications of truck driver.

MATERIAL TESTER & MATERIAL TESTER/INSPECTOR I AND II

Notwithstanding the difference in the classification title, the classification entitled "Material Tester I" involves the same job duties as the classification entitled "Material Tester/Inspector I". Likewise, the classification entitled "Material Tester II" involves the same job duties as the classification entitled "Material Tester/Inspector II".

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING THE ANNUAL FEE FOR LAUNDRY LICENSES FOR THE VILLAGE OF STEGER.

WHEREAS, the Village of Steger, Counties of Cook and Will, State of Illinois (the "Village") is a duly organized and existing municipality and unit of local government created under the provisions of the laws of the State of Illinois, and is operating under the provisions of the Illinois Municipal Code, and all laws amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, with full powers to enact ordinances and adopt resolutions for the benefit of the residents of the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Village President (the "President") and Board of Trustees of the Village (the "Village Board" and together with the President, the "Corporate Authorities") are committed to protecting the health and well-being of Village residents and visitors; and

WHEREAS, Section 11-42-8 of the Illinois Municipal Code (65 ILCS 5/11-42-8) provides that the corporate authorities of each municipality may locate and regulate the use and construction of, among other things, laundries; and

WHEREAS, the Municipal Code of Steger, Illinois (the "Village Code") currently requires that all premises used as laundries within the Village be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition and provides for inspections and licensing of such premises; and

WHEREAS, Section 22-577 of the Village Code provides that the annual fee for laundry licenses shall be as set by separate ordinance; and

WHEREAS, in furtherance of the clean and sanitary operation of laundries and to defray the costs of licensing and inspecting the same, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is necessary, advisable and in the best interests of the Village to provide for an annual fee for laundry licenses as set forth herein; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Steger, Counties of Cook and Will, and the State of Illinois, as follows:

**ARTICLE I.
IN GENERAL**

SECTION 1: Incorporation Clause.

The Corporate Authorities hereby find that all of the recitals hereinbefore stated as contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are full, true and correct and do hereby, by reference, incorporate and make them part of this Ordinance as legislative findings.

SECTION 2: Purpose.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to provide for an annual fee for laundry licenses as set forth herein.

**ARTICLE II.
AUTHORIZATION**

Section 3.00 Authorization.

The Corporate Authorities hereby establish that the annual fee for laundry licenses, as provided for in Section 22-577 of the Village Code, shall be Forty and No/100 U.S. Dollars (\$40.00), plus an additional fee of Three and No/100 U.S. Dollars (\$3.00) for each coin-operated washing machine, clothes dryer, machine dispensing laundry supplies and any other machine located on the same premises that is necessary or incidental to the operation of a laundry. All other vending machines located on the premises of the laundry, which may include, without

limitation, beverage and food vending machines, shall be assessed licensing fees as set forth by other applicable ordinance. The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village shall take all action necessary or reasonably required to carry out, give effect to and consummate the purpose of this Ordinance and shall take all action necessary in conformity therewith.

**ARTICLE III.
HEADINGS, SAVINGS CLAUSES, PUBLICATION,
EFFECTIVE DATE**

SECTION: 4 Headings.

The headings of the articles, sections, paragraphs and subparagraphs of this Ordinance are inserted solely for convenience of reference and form no substantive part of this Ordinance nor should they be used in any interpretation or construction of any substantive provision of this Ordinance.

SECTION: 5 Severability.

The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable and should any provision of this Ordinance be determined to be in conflict with any law, statute or regulation by a court of competent jurisdiction, said provision shall be excluded and deemed inoperative, unenforceable and as though not provided for herein, and all other provisions shall remain unaffected, unimpaired, valid and in full force and effect.

SECTION: 6 Superseder.

To the extent that the provisions of this Ordinance are inconsistent with any other Village code provision, ordinance, resolution, rule, proclamation, enactment, pronouncement, document, instrument or understanding governing or in any other way related to the subject matter of this Ordinance such conflicting authority shall be superseded by this Ordinance to the fullest extent permitted by law.

SECTION: 7 Publication.

A full, true and complete copy of this Ordinance shall be published in pamphlet form or in a newspaper published and of general circulation within the Village as provided by the Illinois Municipal Code, as amended.

SECTION: 8 Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall be effective and in full force immediately upon passage and approval.

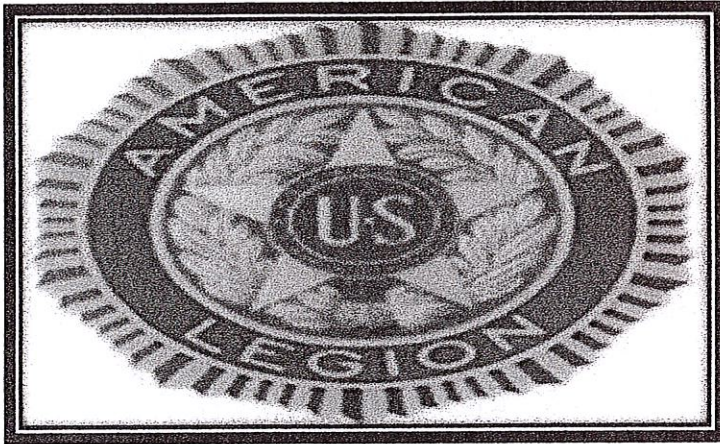
